As such, residents and any other interested parties are invited to a public meeting scheduled for **Monday 24th February, 2025**;



KIHOTO GROUNDS (KENYATTA GARDENS) PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND ADR REPORT

DATE: 24th February, 2025

1. Background Information

Public participation and Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) are critical in ensuring **inclusive urban governance** and effective use of public land. In line with **Article 10 of the Constitution of Kenya 2010**, the **County Governments Act 2012**, and the **PFM Act 2012**, citizens have the right to participate in decision-making processes, especially in planning, infrastructure, and public service delivery.

The **Kihoto Grounds ADR and public participation session** aimed to resolve longstanding land disputes, enabling **Naivasha Municipality** to implement key infrastructure and social projects as outlined in the ISUDP. By addressing ownership and land-use challenges, the Municipality can now plan development in line with urban management priorities, including recreation, youth engagement, and municipal service delivery.

Through public forums, stakeholder consultations, and community discussions, residents expressed a range of views regarding the achievements of the ISUDP, ongoing challenges, and key areas that require improvement in the next phase of implementation.

2. Opening Remarks and Key Contributions

Area MCA – Hon. Alex (AM)

- Applauded the youth for their firm stand in protecting public land.
- Noted ongoing litigation regarding Kihoto Grounds within the sub-county.
- The area MCA requested the public to highlight key issues as proposed in the ISUDP and noted that some challenges like disputes have hindered the realization of the proposals.
- He also urged the public to be keen on the proposed review of the ISUDP.
- Highlighted inadequate public land in Lake View area, where a budget allocation of KSh 4 million for a dispensary could not be implemented.
- Proposed priority developments for Kihoto Grounds:
 - Playground
 - Proposed market
 - Youth stalls around the market
 - MCA office
 - Social hall

MCA Malewa West – Francis Mungai Kuria

- Proposed upgrading Naivasha to city status.
- Recommended prioritizing a dispensary once Kihoto Grounds disputes are resolved.
- Encouraged residents to make informed decisions to attract more development.

Area Chief

- Explained that limited public land has discouraged sponsors such as KPC from supporting community initiatives, with aid redirected to Lake View Primary School.

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- Expressed concern over youth drug abuse and emphasized the need for a Social Hall/Talent Centre to engage the youth productively.
- Stated that the ADR process could transform development prospects in Kihoto.

Chief Officer – Lands and Physical Planning

- Introduced technical staff from the Lands Department and confirmed the department's readiness to implement resolutions following the ADR.
- Reiterated that the Governor is monitoring proceedings and that more projects are planned once disputes are resolved.
- Noted that ongoing litigation has slowed down project implementation across the county.

CECM Lands, Physical Planning, Housing and Urban Development

- Shared personal experience as a resident affected by the land stalemate.
- Emphasized the need for more space to accommodate new developments.
- Applauded the Governor for prioritizing Naivasha's development.
- Noted that Naivasha, Gilgil, and Nakuru are earmarked for support under the Kenya Urban Support Program (KUSP).
- Highlighted projected developments:
 - Stadium
 - Youth empowerment centre
 - Bus parks (funded)
 - Fire station/disaster centre
 - Water project (KSh 120 million water treatment)
 - Economic stimulus programs (Naivasha to have four, others two per sub-county)
- Introduced the Municipal Manager and Director of Environment, awaiting ADR resolutions to commence developments.
- He urged the public to be keen on the existing proposals in the ISUDP. Urged them to be keen during public participation and the decisions arrived at.

County Secretary

- Conveyed greetings from the Governor.
- Highlighted national government plans for a Talent Development & Resource Centre on 6–7 acres.
- Requested fast-tracking of the land issue to enable development.
- Stressed that most sponsors face challenges due to land inadequacy and that proper documentation and accessibility are required.
- Introduced the County Solicitor to support ADR and expedite resolution.

3. Views of Members of the Public

Residents contributed proposals that directly feed into municipal development plans:

These inputs ensure that ward-level proposals align with municipal infrastructure, social, and economic priorities, maximizing benefits to residents.

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4. Brief History – Kenyatta Gardens

- Located along Maai Mahiu–Naivasha Road, Kenyatta Gardens was named after the First President who noted and preserved towering acacia trees in the area.
- Residents have maintained the area to fulfill the President’s vision.

5. NLC Input

- Mr. Mukhtar from NLC explained the mandate of the commission in management of public land, public participation, and ADR processes.

6. 4. ADR Resolutions and Municipal Implications

Municipal Implications:

- Resolving land disputes enables Naivasha Municipality to implement priority projects such as: playgrounds, markets, youth stalls, social halls, dispensaries, stadiums, and talent/resource centers.
- Aligns with municipal objectives for youth engagement, recreation, social services, and urban development.
- Unlocks sponsor funding and county resources previously hindered by land disputes.

The resolutions aim to conserve public space, clarify ownership, and allow planned developments while maintaining community and environmental interests.

7. Key Proposed Developments

Following the ADR and public participation exercise, the proposed projects for Kihoto Grounds include:

- Playground and recreational facilities
- Market and youth stalls
- MCA office
- Social hall / Talent Centre
- Dispensary / Health facilities
- Stadium
- Drop points and bus parks for commercial vehicles
- Housing improvements and decongestion initiatives
- Youth empowerment programs

These projects are expected to proceed once the land disputes are fully resolved and necessary documentation is completed.

8. ISUDP review

8.1 Perceived Achievements and Positive Developments

Residents acknowledged several improvements within the municipality since the initial implementation of the ISUDP. Many noted that the plan had helped guide more structured development in Naivasha and provided a framework for prioritizing infrastructure investments. Improvements in road networks in some parts of the municipality were particularly highlighted, with residents reporting easier access to markets, schools, and health facilities. Enhanced street lighting in certain neighborhoods was also recognized as contributing to improved safety and increased business activity during evening hours.

Another positive development noted by residents was the growing recognition of Naivasha as an important economic hub. The continued growth of the horticulture sector, tourism activities around Lake Naivasha, and the establishment of new industrial and logistics investments were viewed as opportunities that have stimulated employment and expanded the local economy. Residents expressed appreciation for initiatives that seek to integrate economic development with spatial planning, particularly those aimed at improving market spaces and supporting small and medium enterprises.

Residents also appreciated efforts by the municipality to involve communities in planning discussions. Public participation forums during the preparation and review of the ISUDP were seen as an important platform where residents could express their concerns, contribute ideas, and better understand municipal development priorities. This engagement was viewed as a positive step toward building trust between the municipality and local communities.

8.2 Key Challenges Raised by Residents

Despite the noted achievements, residents also raised several challenges that continue to affect daily life in Naivasha. One of the most frequently mentioned concerns was the uneven distribution of infrastructure and services across different neighborhoods. While some areas have benefited from road upgrades, drainage improvements, and street lighting, others, particularly rapidly growing informal and peri-urban settlements, continue to face inadequate infrastructure.

Water supply and sanitation were identified as persistent challenges. Residents reported that in some areas, water availability remains inconsistent, forcing households to rely on alternative sources that may be costly or unreliable. Similarly, inadequate sewerage and waste management systems were highlighted as concerns that affect public health and environmental quality. Residents also emphasized the issue of solid waste management. Increasing population growth and economic activities have led to higher volumes of waste, and in some areas, collection services are irregular. This has resulted in illegal dumping and environmental degradation, particularly near residential areas and waterways.

Traffic congestion and road safety were also raised as emerging issues. With the growth of commercial activities and increased transport movement, residents reported congestion in certain parts of the town center and along key access routes. Pedestrian safety, particularly for school children and market users, was identified as an area requiring greater attention in future planning.

Another concern expressed by residents relates to land use and urban expansion. Rapid urban growth has led to pressure on land, resulting in unplanned developments in some areas. Residents indicated that stronger development control and clearer land use guidance are necessary to ensure that future growth is orderly, inclusive, and environmentally sustainable. Also a major concern arose from land subdivision especially Kedong Ranch that has impacted on the relocation of the wildlife from Naivasha to Nairobi and Laikipia.

8.3 Residents' priorities for the updated ISUDP

Looking ahead, residents emphasized several priorities that they would like to see addressed in the next phase of the ISUDP. A key priority is the equitable provision of infrastructure and services across all parts of the municipality. Residents stressed the importance of extending road improvements, drainage systems, water supply, and sanitation services to underserved areas, particularly informal settlements and newly developed neighborhoods.

Residents also called for stronger environmental management measures. Given Naivasha's proximity to Lake Naivasha and its sensitive ecosystem, communities highlighted the need for improved waste management, protection of wetlands, and measures to reduce pollution entering the lake. Residents expressed concern that environmental degradation could negatively affect both livelihoods and tourism.

Economic opportunities were another major priority raised during consultations. Residents

indicated that while large-scale investments bring benefits, there is also a need to support local entrepreneurs, youth, and small businesses. They recommended improved market infrastructure, vocational training opportunities, and initiatives that encourage local participation in emerging economic sectors.

Housing and settlement planning were also identified as important areas for attention. Residents expressed the need for affordable housing solutions and improved upgrading programs for informal settlements. They emphasized that housing initiatives should be integrated with infrastructure, social services, and access to employment opportunities.

8.4 Strengthening Community Participation

Residents consistently highlighted the importance of sustained community engagement in municipal planning processes. While public participation during the ISUDP preparation and review was appreciated, residents suggested that engagement should continue throughout implementation. They proposed regular feedback mechanisms, community forums, and improved communication channels between the municipality and residents.

Such mechanisms would allow residents to monitor progress, raise emerging concerns, and contribute to identifying practical solutions for local development challenges. Strengthening collaboration between the municipality, community organizations, and other stakeholders was seen as essential for ensuring that development initiatives respond effectively to local needs.


9. Conclusion

The ADR and public participation exercise at Kihoto Grounds successfully brought together county officials, technical staff, community representatives, and residents to resolve long-standing land disputes.


Participants expressed satisfaction with the process, highlighting that it provided a clear path for development, improved understanding among stakeholders, and laid the foundation for future infrastructure, social, and economic projects.

The County Government of Nakuru, through the Governor, CECM, Municipal Manager, and technical officers, reaffirmed its commitment to fast-tracking resolutions, promoting inclusive development, and leveraging Naivasha's urban status to deliver key projects to the area.

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Closing Remarks

The public participation and ADR session concluded with updates and remarks from key officials regarding ongoing and proposed development initiatives in the area:

Updates on Development Status

- **Bursaries:** Progress on the disbursement and allocation of educational bursaries was shared with residents.
- **Uji Programme:** A total of **59 beneficiaries** have been supported with **KSh 65,000** under the community nutrition initiative.
- **Vocational Training:** Updates were provided on ongoing vocational training opportunities for youth and community members.
- **CHPs (Community Health Projects):** Since 2008–2015, a total of **25 CHPs** have been implemented to enhance local health services.

Remarks by CECM Lands, Physical Planning, Housing and Urban Development

- Proposed establishment of a **Social Hall** to engage youth and support community activities.

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- **Kenyatta Gardens:** Highlighted as a priority area for planned development following the ADR resolutions.

Remarks by MCA Alex

- Proposed utilization of **Veterinary land** in Lakeview for the **expansion of the playground**, enhancing recreational spaces for the community.

These closing remarks emphasized the County Government of Nakuru's commitment to **inclusive, citizen-driven development** and the prioritization of projects that address social, educational, and recreational needs within Naivasha Municipality.
